

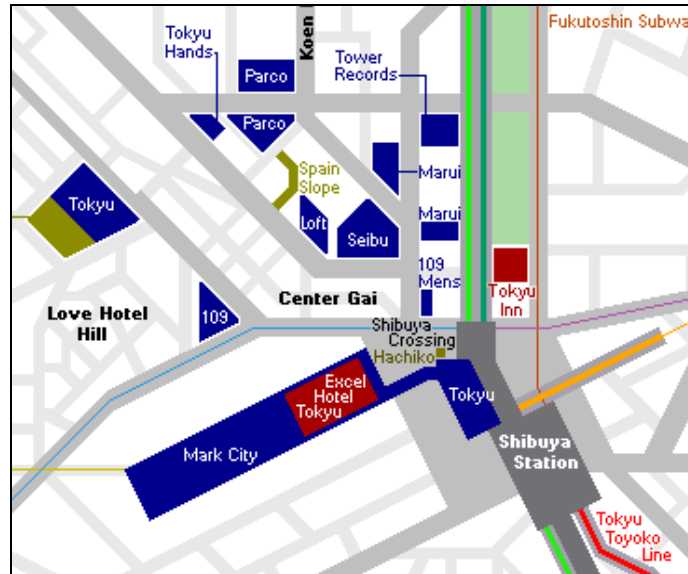

Tokyo Metro Map

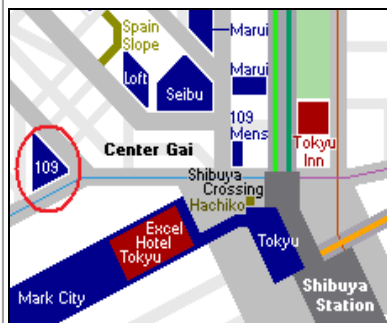
SHIBUYA (渋谷)




Name: **109 Building (A)**

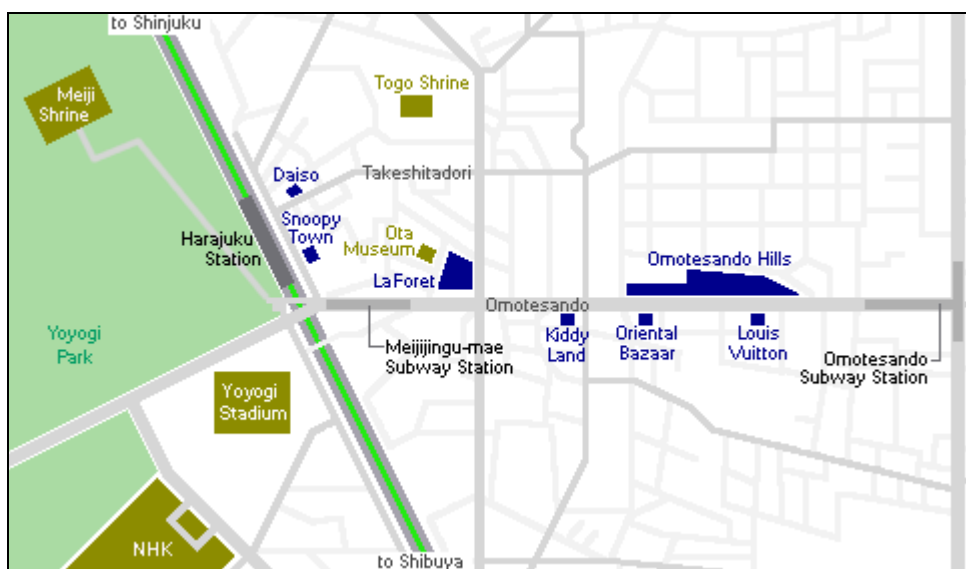



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|  |  | <p>Type: <i>(Sightseeing)</i> Name: <u>Center Gai</u> The birthplace of many Japanese fashion trends, Center Gai is a busy pedestrian zone lined by stores, boutiques, game centers, small night clubs and restaurants.</p> |
|  |  | <p>Type: <i>(Sightseeing)</i> Name: <u>Hachiko Statue</u> A statue of a loyal dog named Hachiko. According to a famous story, the dog waited for his master every day in front of Shibuya Station, and continued to do so for years even after his master had passed away. It is one of Tokyo's most popular meeting points.</p> |
|  |  | <p>Type: <i>(CDs, DVDs and Books)</i> Name: <u>Tsutaya</u> This is a really cool place to people watch. Get a matcha frappuchino at Starbucks and observe people walking through the largest and most famous intersection in Tokyo. 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|  |  | <p>Type: (Japanese Souvenir Shop) Name: <u>Oriental Bazaar</u> This is one of Tokyo's largest souvenir shops, very popular among foreign travelers in search of typical Japanese souvenirs, such as kimono, tableware, lamps, dolls, furniture and samurai related goods. Takeshita Dori The symbol of Harajuku and birthplace of many of Japan's fashion trends, Takeshita Dori (Takeshita Street) is a narrow, roughly 400 meter long street lined by shops, boutiques, cafes and fast food outlets targeting Tokyo's teenagers. *Shops along Takeshita Dori tend to be open daily from 11:00 to 20:00.*

SHINJUKU (新宿)

Name: Tokyu Hands

Promoted as "Creative Life Store", Tokyu Hands has everything from do-it-yourself, interior, hobby, crafts, outdoors to stationery and more. A *Kinokuniya* book store (with a large foreign language section) is located in the same building complex, also known as 'Times Square'. *Open daily from 10:00 to 20:00; restaurants from 11:00 to 23:00.*

Name: Isetan & Shopping Area

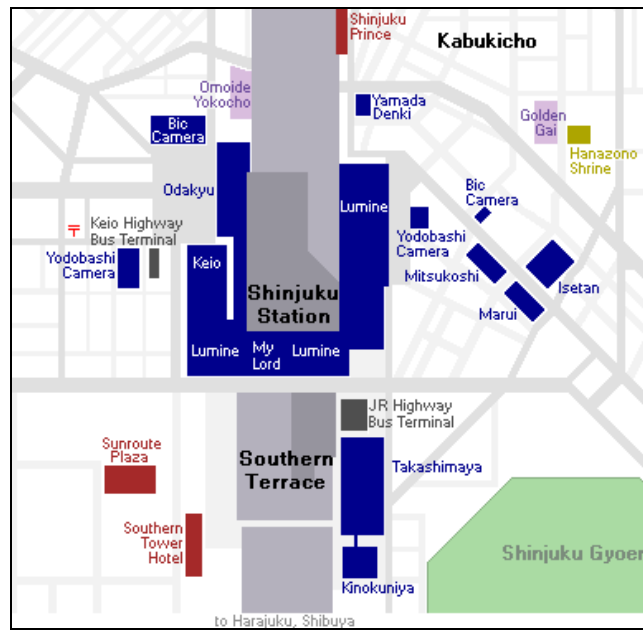
With a history of more than 100 years Isetan is a veteran among Shinjuku's department stores.

Lumine: (Department Store)

Lumine is owned by JR East and located next and above Shinjuku Station's South Exit. Lumine is divided into a "Lumine 1" west of and "Lumine 2" east of the South Exit. Lumine 1 consists of ten, Lumine 2 of seven floors, including various restaurants.

Open daily from 11:00 to 22:00; restaurants until 23:00.

Odakyu Department Store consists of 16 floors, including a wonderful food department in the basement and restaurant floors. The department store belongs to the Odakyu Group, which also operates a suburban railway line from Shinjuku to Odawara (Odakyu is an abbreviation for "Odawara Express").

Open daily from 10:00 to 20:00; restaurants from 11:00 to 22:00.

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|  | <p>Keio: <i>(Department Store)</i> Keio Department Store consists of 11 floors, including a food department in the basement and several restaurants on the restaurant floor. <i>Open daily from 10:00 to 20:00; restaurants from 11:00 to 22:00.</i> http://info.keionet.com/shinjuku/index.html</p> |
|  | <p>Yodobashi Camera : <i>(Electronics)</i> Yodobashi Camera is one of Japan's leading discount electronics retailers, and especially strong on camera equipment. Yodobashi's main store is located near the west exit of Shinjuku Station, while a smaller branch is located near the station's east exit. <i>Open daily from 9:30 to 22:00.</i> http://www.yodobashi.com/</p> |
|  | <p>Bic Camera: <i>(Electronics)</i> Bic Camera is another of Japan's leading discount electronics retailers. |  | <p>Tokyo Metropolitan Government Office (Tocho): The 243 meter tall twin towers and surrounding buildings contain the offices and the assembly hall of the metropolitan government of Tokyo, as well as observatories on the 45th floor of each tower. The view from the southern tower is considered slightly more interesting. <i>Open daily 9:30 to 23:00 (south observatory until 17:30), except December 29-31, January 2-3 and occasional inspection days. Furthermore, the north observatory is closed on the 2nd and 4th Monday and the south observatory on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month, except if a public holiday falls on the closure day, in which case the observatory is closed the following day. |  | <p>Shinjuku Skyscraper District: Among the skyscrapers are the Tocho (see above) and some of Tokyo's leading hotels, including the Keio Plaza, Hilton, Century Hyatt and Park Hyatt (featured in <i>Lost in Translation</i>). Several of the other skyscrapers have some shops on their ground floors and restaurants with great views of the city on their top floors. <i>The restaurants in the skyscrapers tend to be open from around 11:00 to 23:00. Some restaurants close for a few hours between lunch and dinner.</i></p> |

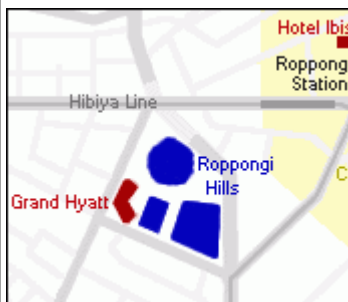
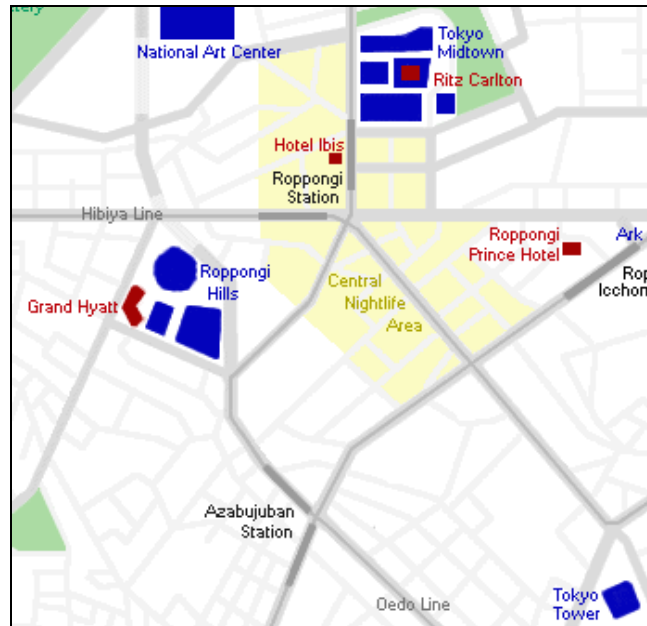


Kabukicho:

Named after a kabuki theater, whose construction plans have never been realized, Japan's largest red light district features countless restaurants, bars, pachinko parlors, love hotels and a wide variety of red light establishments for both sexes and sexual orientations. Explore with caution and beware of exorbitant cover fees.

Kabuki-cho comes to life daily after 18:00, and especially so on Fridays and Saturdays.









Name: **Roppongi Hills & (Tokyo Tower)**

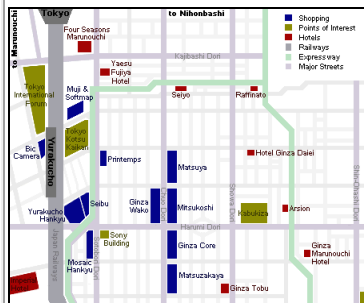
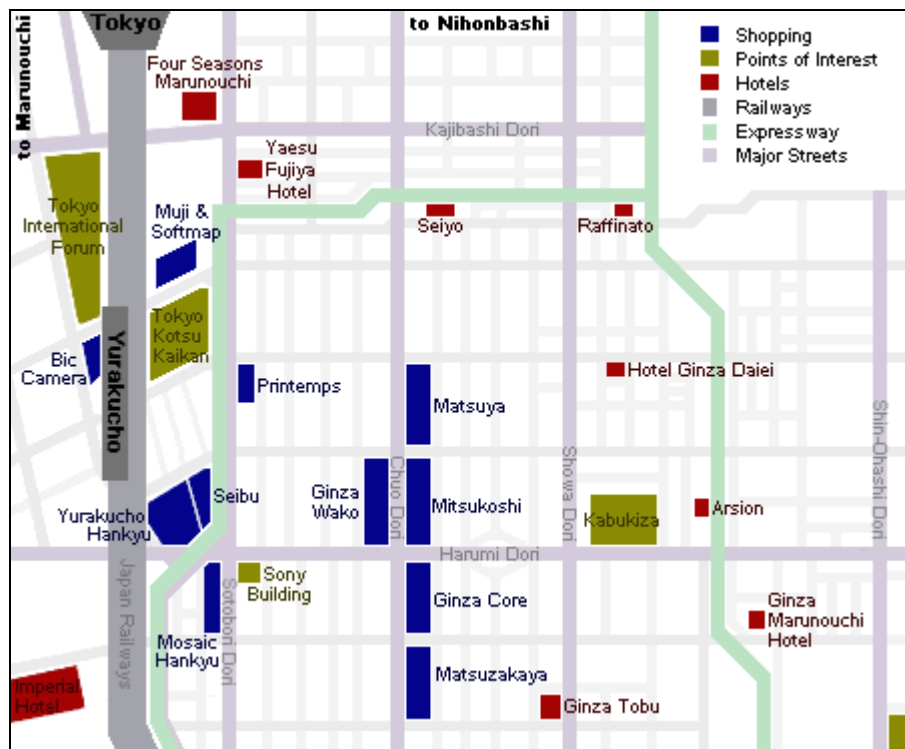
The first six floors are occupied by shops and restaurants, while the top six floors house an art museum and observation deck. Roppongi Hills features more than 200 shops, cafes and restaurants. Most shops specialize in fashion, accessories, interior design and household goods, while restaurants offer a wide array of Japanese and international cuisine. *Mori Garden*: A small oasis of greenery between the tall buildings of Roppongi Hills, the Mori Garden is built in the style of a traditional Japanese landscape garden.

Most shops are open daily from 11:00 to 21:00. Restaurants are typically open from 11:00 to 23:00.

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|  |  | <p>Type: <i>(Sightseeing)</i> Name: <u>Tokyo Tower</u> With 333 meters, Tokyo Tower is 13 meters taller than its model, the Eiffel Tower of Paris, and the world's tallest self-supporting steel tower. It was completed in the year 1958 as a symbol for Japan's rebirth as a major economic power, and serves as a television and radio broadcast antenna and tourist attraction. <i>Hours: Daily 10:00 to 21:00</i> <i>Admission: 1420 Yen (to top floor), 820 Yen (to intermediate floor only)</i> http://www.tokyotower.co.jp/eng/secret/</p> |
|  |  | <p>Type: <i>(Shopping)</i> Name: <u>Roppongi Mid Town</u> The Midtown Tower is with 248 meters Tokyo's tallest building. Name: Ginza

Unlike the Harajuku, Shibuya and Shinjuku shopping districts, which are frequented mostly by young people, Ginza is also very popular among the older generations and the wealthy. Ginza is expensive. It is here, where you can find the infamous \$10 cups of coffee.

Most stores are open daily between 11:00 and 19:00 or longer. Ginza is most attractive on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, when the central Chuo Street gets closed to traffic and become a large pedestrian zone.














TOKYO STATION (東京駅)



Type: (Imperial Palace)

Name: **Imperial Palace**

Tokyo Imperial Palace, the residence of Japan's Imperial Family, stands on the former site of Edo Castle. The outer moats can be reached in a five minute walk from Tokyo Station. Please visit our Imperial Palace page for more details.

The inner palace grounds are not accessible to the public except on pre-arranged tours. The outer moats, gates and bridges, as well as the East Gardens (see below), however, can be seen free of charge.



Type: (Shops)

Name: **Marubiru and Marubiru2**

Opened in front of Tokyo Station, the Marubiru is Marunouchi's new landmark. Shops and restaurants are located on the floors B1 to 6 as well as on the two top floors 35 and 36, while office and business space occupies the floors in between.

Shops are open from 11:00 to 21:00 (20:00 on Sundays and public holidays), restaurants from 11:00 to 23:00 (22:00 on Sundays and public holidays).

Tsukiji Fish Market:

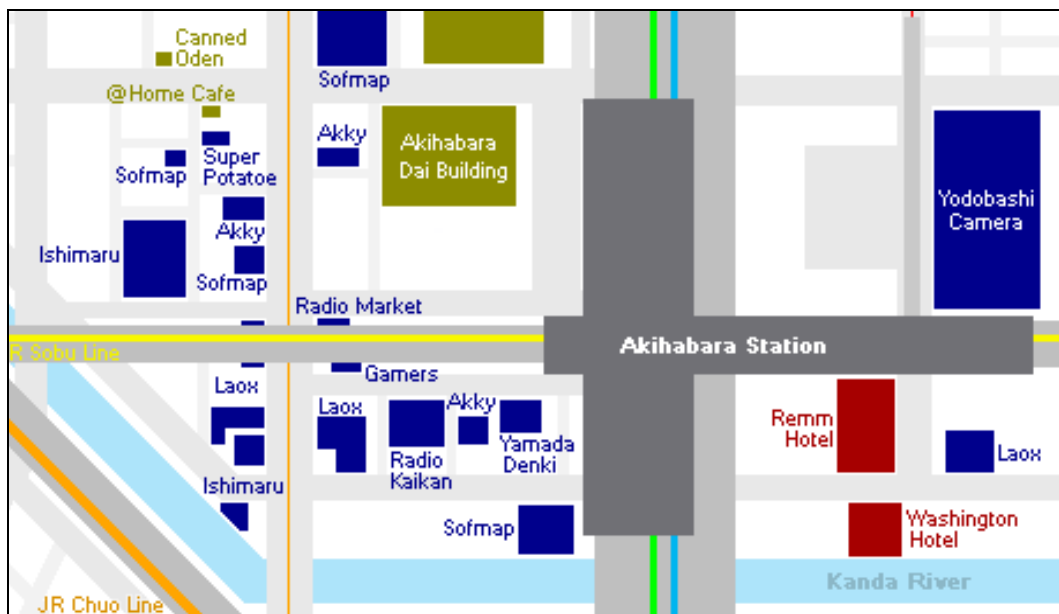
Tsukiji Central Wholesale Market is a large wholesale market for fish, fruit and vegetables in central Tokyo. It is the most famous of over ten wholesale markets that handle the collection and distribution of fruit, vegetables, flowers, meat and fish in metropolitan Tokyo. Tsukiji Market is best known as one of the world's largest fish markets, handling over 2,000 tons of marine products per day.






The sight of the many kinds of fresh fish, shellfish and other seafood and the busy atmosphere of scooters, trucks, sellers and buyers hurrying around, make Tsukiji Market one of Tokyo's major tourist attractions. A visit to Tsukiji Market is best combined with a sushi breakfast at one of the several restaurants which are located in the market.

A visit is most recommended in the early and busy morning hours before 9am.

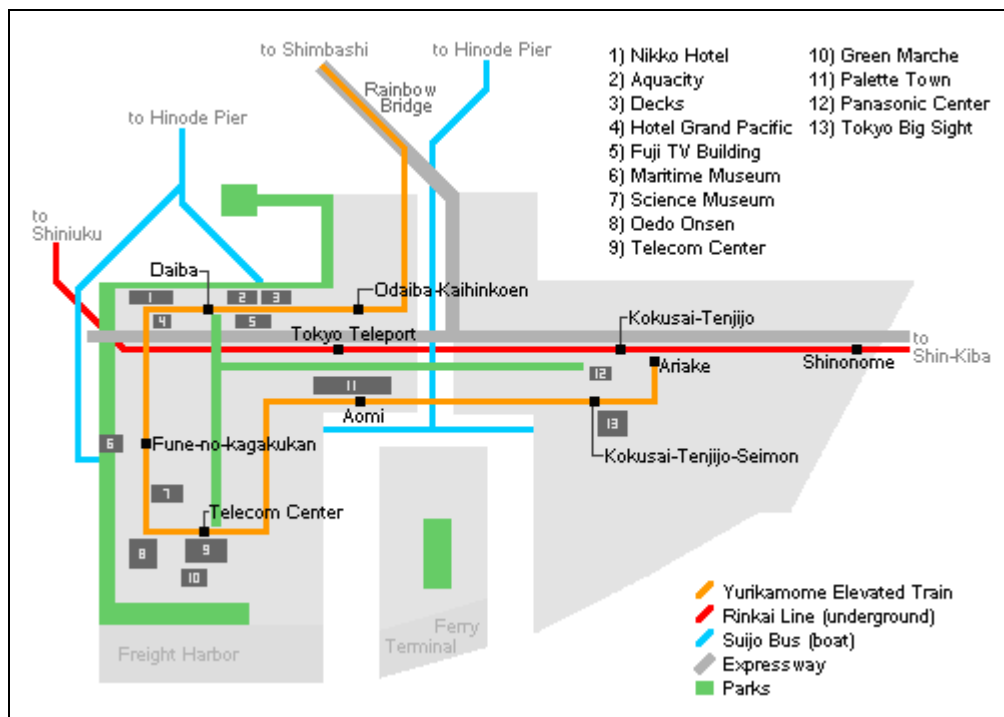


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|  | <p>Akihabara (short: Akiba) is a district in central Tokyo, famous for its many electronics shops. In recent years, it has also gained fame as a center of the gaming, manga and animation culture. A major redevelopment of Akihabara Station and surroundings is nearing its completion, giving Akihabara a new face. Hundreds of electronics shops of various sizes can be found around Akihabara Station and along Chuo Dori (Chuo Avenue). They offer everything from the newest computers, cameras, televisions, mobile phones and home appliances to second-hand goods and electronic junk.</p> |
|  | <p>Type: <i>(Electronics)</i> Name: <u>Yodobashi Camera</u> Yodobashi Camera opened its huge Akihabara branch in September 2005. Unlike most other electronic shops, it is located on the east side of Akihabara Station, in the new Yodobashi Akiba Building. Open daily 9:30am to 10:00pm. http://www.yodobashi.com/</p> |
|  | <p>Type: <i>(Electronics)</i> Name: <u>Yamada Denki - LABI</u> Yamada Denki operates a "LABI" store just across the street from the Akihabara Electric Town exit of JR Akihabara Station. SENSOJI TEMPLE - (ASAKUSA)

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|  | <p>Sensoji (also known as Asakusa Kannon Temple) is a temple located in Asakusa, a central part of the Shitamachi. Shitamachi ("downtown") is the old town of Tokyo. When approaching the temple, visitors first enter through the Kaminarimon (Thunder Gate), the outer gate of the Sensoji and one of the most popular sights of traditional Tokyo. A shopping street of over 200 meters, called Nakamise, leads from the outer gate to the temple's main gate, the Hozomon.</p> <p>http://www.senso-ji.jp/</p> |
|  | <p>The Nakamise shopping street stretches over approximately 250 meters from Kaminarimon to the main grounds of Sensoji Temple. It is lined by more than 50 shops, which offer local specialties and the usual array of tourist souvenirs. <i>Opening hours depend on the individual shops. Typically daily from 9:00 to 19:00.</i></p> |
|  | <p>The Tokyo Skytree is a new television broadcasting tower and landmark of Tokyo, not far from Asakusa. It is the tallest building in Japan and the second tallest structure in the world at the time of its completion. 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|  | <p><u>Decks Tokyo Beach:</u></p> <p>Decks is a shopping mall featuring various stores, boutiques, cafes, restaurants, the food theme park "Daiba Little Hong Kong" and "Tokyo Joypolis", three floors packed with the newest arcade games and more.</p> <p><i>Open daily 11:00 to 21:00 (some stores and restaurants remain open until 22:00 or 23:00).
